

A saviour in a driver!

As Rotary celebrates World Polio Day on Oct 24th, I am going down the memory lanes. One incident

among many that had a longlasting impact is prime in the memory.

Nearly fourteen years back I had just joined Rotary; and soon I was assigned the task to be the Observer for the Pulse Polio Mission for the administrative district of SAS Nagar. The observers for various administrative districts of Punjab were imparted training at Patiala where various aspects of the drive and the challenges that may come accompanied with it; and how to handle the same were discussed in detail in one day session. This session brought forth the luminaries of Punjab, Haryana and Chandigarh who had been in the forefront of this fight against the Polio Virus. Just to name a few, PP Rtn. Surinder Kumar Girdhar from Patiala: PP Rtn. Shubh Karan from Ludhiana and not to forget our very own PDG Rtn. Praveen Goel (then a Past President). Their experience was vast, and inspired us to put best foot forward. Also got a chance to attend an intercity of RI districts of 3070, 3080 and 3090 where the then health minister Ms. Laxmi Kanta Chawla was the chief guest and her dedication to make India Polio fee was inspiring indeed.

First polio drive as an observer, I became compassionate toward the vaccinators having realised the distances they have to cover on foot specially on the second and third day when they have to go from house to house to vaccinate the children. As we were told to carry out audits, the third day of the polio drive took me to Sector 78, where a construction site of Housefed, Punjab turned out to be an area where the vaccination was not carried out. Few more hours spent in driving in the town, and soon we had the construction sites in Sector 91, Indian Institute of Science Education & research (IISER), Indian School of Business (ISB), the upcoming residential towers Sector 105, 108, 109; the hutments along the upcoming Airport Road were added to the list.

It was difficult to reckon the number of children not vaccinated during this drive. My call to Rtn. PDG Praveen Goel was picked up in no time, and his reply, "I will ask the health authorities to extend the drive," brought back the momentum.

However, the discussions with the health authorities and a health officer of WHO (whose name I can't recollect now) who used to come all the way from Ambala revealed that the urban area of SAS Nagar was covered by the Civil Hospital,

SAS Nagar (CHM)and the rural area by Government Hospital, Gharuan (GHG). Health authorities at CHM maintained that the areas so identified were to be covered by CHG and they did it in

the last drive too. However, the reason given by CHG was pestilential. "Now that the construction has started in these areas, they are no longer rural!".

Could we leave children unvaccinated as few of them had derived their own carry out the drive in the "left out areas" and identify other such prone areas.

He had collected the copy from Mohali for his office, last year.

The health officer from WHO was strategist. We decided to remain tight lipped on this, and he said that he could only comment on seeing the said document the next day.

A closure meeting was already planned for the next day at CHM, and the copy of the letter was presented! And soon the other copy of the same from the files of CHM was traced. "We only need to follow what our predecessors agreed to," said the Civil Surgeon! They had clearly noted that construction of few buildings/roads can't change the demarcation. The "urban/rural issue" was long resolved, rather should have not cropped again, but for....!

A well aware driver had changed the course for countless kids; and turned out to be an altruistic for kids of SAS Nagar! An unsung hero among many others!

The president continued by reporting that, on 3rd October, under Project Drishti, free cataract surgeries were successfully conducted under the supervision of Dr. Aditya and PP Rtn. Gurcharan Singh, bringing the total number of surgeries to 55.

On 8th October, President Rtn. Dilpreet Singh Boparai, Vice President Rtn. Kuldip Singh Dhody, and Rtn. Amanpreet Singh visited Vidya Valley School in Kharar to invite them to form an Interact Club, which the school has affirmed. Additionally, the club has received the charters for the Interact Clubs of The Millennium School and YPS, bringing the total number of Interact Clubs under RCMM to six. On

10th October, AG Rtn. Ravijeet Singh had the opportunity to exchange flags with President Tomasz Michalik from the Rotary Club of Białystok, Poland.



On 9th October, PP Rtn. Amarjit Singh Virk made a contribution of 100\$ to The Rotary Foundation (TRF) on his birthday, inspiring other members to make similar contributions on their special days. That same day, it was announced that Rotary District 3080 received a Rotary International Citation for the year 2023-24, recognizing its outstanding achievements. The district was ranked 19th globally out of 529 districts. The president congratulated the leadership and members for this remarkable accomplishment. On 10th October, the club, in coordination with the Rotaract Club of Khalsa College, organized a blood donation camp, and the district collected a record 6,000 units of blood in just the first three months.

The president then highlighted several upcoming projects, including health talks, the installation of the Interact Clubs at The Millennium School and YPS, and a toy distribution project at Brookfield International School. The club is also planning to donate beds to a newly built old age home during Diwali, and discussions are ongoing with S.S. Sabharwal of Charitable Tera Tera Trust. Additionally, the president was excited to announce an upcoming initiative by Rtn. Ankit Beri and PP Rtn. Sukhpreet Singh Giani to launch a podcast channel, which will enhance the public image of the club information about its share and activities.

Club secretary, Rtn. Prabhjot Kaur, welcomed the visiting guest, President Rtn. Harvinder Singh, and invited her to share information about his club-The Rotary Club of Broadmeadows, Victoria, Australia.



He shared that their club, which is 60 years old, holds weekly meetings. He spoke about the club's environmental projects, such as tree plantations in

collaboration with Interact Clubs, donating machines hospitals, to contributing funds for international sanitation projects, and donating \$10,000 and computers to an orphanage in Mumbai. Rtn. Harvinder also discussed their weekly fundraising efforts through stalls and barbecues, raising around \$2,000 weekly. He mentioned regular visits to gurdwaras and temples with fellow Rotarians, quarterly meetings with neighbouring clubs, and a joint project with four other clubs to donate an ambulance. One of their most notable projects involved sponsoring the surgical separation of cojoined twin sisters and covering their living expenses for 8 months post-surgery.

Rtn. Harvinder Singh concluded by offering a collaborative international project between his club and the Rotary Club of Mohali Midtown, thanking the members for their hospitality. PP Rtn. Sukhpreet Singh Giani gave a formal vote of thanks. The meeting was adjourned by the president, followed by a cake-cutting ceremony.

Eradicating Polio has not been an easy task

Efforts by Rotary and other associated organisations in eradicating polio have been a long and challenging one, with Rotary leading the fight since 1985. Going from nearly 350,000 cases in 1988 to just under 5 in 2024. This has required time, money, dedication and innovation from thousands of people who are working to end the disease.

- There are 3 strains of wild poliovirus, none of which can survive for long periods outside of the human body. If the virus cannot find an unvaccinated person to infect, it will die out. Type 2 wild poliovirus was eradicated in 1999 and cases of type 3 wild poliovirus haven't been found anywhere in the world since 2012.
- There are 2 forms of vaccine available to ward off polio oral polio vaccine (OPV) and inactivated polio vaccine (IPV). Because OPV is an oral vaccine, it can be administered by anyone, even volunteers. One dose of OPV costs as little as 14 cents.
- Health workers and Rotary volunteers have climbed mountains, crossed deserts and sailed to remote islands, risking their lives to vaccinate children against this disease.
- Vaccinators have even travelled on the backs of elephants, donkeys,

- and camels to immunise children in remote areas.
- Rotary has funded more than 1,500 motorbikes and 6,700 other vehicles, as well as 17 boats.
- Ice cream factories in Syria have helped in freezing the ice packs that health workers use to keep the polio vaccine cold during the immunisation campaigns.
- In Pakistan, the polio programme has emphasised hiring local women vaccinators and monitors. More than 21,000 vaccinators, 83 per cent of whom are women, are achieving the highest immunisation coverage rates in the country's history.
- Since 2012, at least 70 polio workers have been killed in Pakistan. Many of the attacks have been claimed by the Taliban, who forward claims that the vaccination campaigns are a facade for intelligence gathering.
